Ontario Provincial Police Community Relations Award



At the 2017 Provincial Annual Meeting, President Renate Schuetz and Citizenship Officer Caroline Rodgers were please to present the IODE OPP Community Relations Award to OPP Constable Sandro Cave from the Kirkland Lake Detachment.

Constable Sandro Cave started his career in 2008 with the OPP after serving in the OPP Auxiliary Programme for 10 years. The auxiliary programme is a volunteer programme that assists the OPP in patrol and community duties.

Constable Cave is a community minded person and gives freely of his time, his personal conduct, beliefs and values, the relationships he develops and the way he carries himself personify what it means to serve his community with pride.

Constable Cave started his giving to the community as an Auxiliary Officer and continues to the present day.

He is involved with the Salvation Army in their Christmas Kettle campaign and gives of his time to attend local schools to provide lectures on bullying and self-esteem. Constable Cave is involved as the co-ordinator of the Law Enforcement Torch Run for the Special Olympics Committee and fundraises. As the Co-ordinator, he has raised near \$17,000.00 for the Special Olympics in Kirkland Lake.

He volunteers his time with Meals on Wheels and The Boys and Girls Club. Constable Cave and his wife Tracy give of themselves by being foster parents to over 25 children in the community. This included billeting a hockey player for the Kirkland Lake Goldminers' Junior Hockey A Club.

Constable Cave is an active coach with the Kirkland Lake Soccer Association and volunteers with the Kirkland Lake Skating Club.

He volunteers his time with the other members of the OPP and the Kirkland Lake Goldminers Junior A Hockey Club in their annual food drive for the Salvation Army Christmas Campaigns. Each year the amount of food gathered increases enough to cram 10 cruisers with foodstuffs. Cash donations to this drive have totalled over \$7,000.00.

He annually attends and volunteers his time at the Remembrance Day ceremonies and every year he gives a presentation on elder abuse/fraud at the Encore Club 50+, where he is currently working on a fundraising project to be able to construct a new kitchen. He annually appears as the guest chef cooking a meal in his native Caribbean style for 250 people, this event has raised over \$5.000.00.

Constable Cave is a **VOLUNTEER**:

- On Kirkland Lake Crime Stoppers Board of Directors
- In all detachment associated fundraising endeavors playing in charity hockey games each year to help various charities. (Crime stoppers, Canadian Cancer Society and Heart and Stroke)
- On the Board of Directors for the Kirkland Lake Rotary Club
- On call volunteer as a Mental Health Care Crisis worker.
- Member of the Kirkland Lake Road Safety Coalition to ensure our roadways are safe
- With the Kirkland Lake Skating Club

PC Cave organized a "Push for Change" an event to support community awareness of youth homelessness in Canada. This was a hockey challenge event which he coordinated sponsors, community partners and coaches. PC Cave partnered with the Mental Health Association of the Cochrane/Temiskaming Branch to ensure that they were in attendance with information and interactive displays for all in attendance.

In 2016, PC Cave was honoured by the OPP as the Accolade Award winner for his Community Service work.

As PC Cave demonstrated a firm commitment to his community and goes above and beyond his duties of an OPP officer he is a deserving recipient of the **IODE OPP Community Relations Award.**

Celebrating New Canadiansby Caroline Rodgers, IODE Ontario Citizenship Officer

As Canadians, we are proud of our citizenship. We value the rights and freedoms and accept the responsibilities. New citizens take the oath of citizenship to become Canadian at ceremonies across the country. Most are open to the public.

A citizenship ceremony is the final step in the process of becoming a Canadian citizen. During the ceremony, the new citizen receives a Certificate of Canadian Citizenship. Guests attending the ceremony, who are already Canadian citizens, are invited to reaffirm their commitment to Canada by repeating the oath along with the new citizens. IODE Chapters have been part of Citizenship ceremonies for many years.

Groups are encouraged to participate in hosting a citizenship ceremony at Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada facilitates or at a community-based site.

IODE Chapters can benefit from hosting a ceremony by:

- raising your chapter's profile in the community
- celebrating Canadian citizenship with Canada's newest citizens
- promoting the values of citizenship in the community and recognizing the responsibilities of citizenship
- Encouraging the acquisition of citizenship by members of your group.



This past May, I was privileged to join President Renate Schuetz, 2nd Vice President Shirley Ann Elms, members from the IODE Dr. Elizabeth Bagshaw Chapter, Hamilton and IODE Freelton Chapter, Freelton. These chapters were presented with Certificates of Recognition and thanked for their years of participation in Citizenship Courts at the Hamilton office of Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada.



Recently a primary chapter asked the question "Can you clarify the preferred process for the flow of information/issues/questions from primary chapters all the way up to National? i.e. what issues should be raised with the Provincial Chapter vs what issues should be addressed National directly? What issues can be addressed with your Area Vice President vs a local provincial councillor?"

Annually we elect Provincial and National **Councillors**. These councillors represent you at the level she is elected to. We have various committees that the councillor sits on. It is her responsibility to act in the best interest of our organization while keeping in mind how decisions will impact chapters in her area.

All chapters are required to pass requests or enquiries through the jurisdictional chapter e.g. primary chapters write to the municipal chapter (if a municipal chapter exists) or the Provincial Chapter. The Provincial Chapter will forward the request or enquiry to the National Chapter. It is important that the jurisdictional chapters are aware of the requests being forwarded to National in order that the jurisdictional chapter can provide their support as well as are aware of the work being suggested by the primary chapter.

Provincial **Area Vice-Presidents** are an executive member of IODE Ontario and may be asked to represent the Chapter or the President in her defined area as required. Taking guidance from the President, she is the liaison between the chapters in her area and the Provincial Chapter. This Officer is familiar with IODE work at the National, Provincial, and Municipal levels by reading reports of other jurisdictional levels. She is called upon to provide advice in regards to the chapters in her area to the Provincial Executive Committee.

The following is from the Primary Chapter Regulations to be used in conjunction with General Operating By-Law No. 1. Copies can be downloaded from www.iodeontario.ca Member's Resource page.

"Forward all communications directed to the National Chapter through the immediate jurisdictional chapter to the attention of the jurisdictional secretary. All requests should be supported by complete and relevant information.

The purpose of a jurisdictional chapter is to support the chapters in their area, assist with communications, respond to requests for such things as grant applications and approval to sell items for fundraising. A Primary Chapter may have a Municipal Chapter as their jurisdictional chapter. Where there is no Municipal Chapter, the jurisdictional chapter will be the Provincial Chapter. In cases where there is no Provincial Chapter, the jurisdictional chapter is The National Chapter of Canada IODE.

A chapter's By-Laws and any changes made must be forwarded to the chapter having jurisdiction for approval. Any change to a chapter's by-laws becomes effective immediately after being passed, subject only to the veto of the chapter having jurisdiction. If any by-law is vetoed, the chapter shall have the right of appeal through its provincial chapter to the National Board of Directors and the decision of the Board shall be final.

It is important to note that permission must be obtained from the National Board of Directors for extended use of the logo, i.e. on articles to be sold by chapters. Organizations outside of IODE require permission from IODE Canada for use of the logo.

No provincial, municipal or primary chapter may apply for grants from foundations or trusts without prior approval of the Board of Directors. The IODE Grant Application Form must be completed (available on the IODE Canada website or from head office) and sent with accompanying financial statements and budget to the Board of Directors through the regular channels.





ONTARIO VOLUNTEER SERVICE

Ontario Volunteer Service Awards are presented at ceremonies across Ontario from March to June. The recipients are given a stylized trillium service pin and a personalized certificate to acknowledge their years of service. Each recipient can bring one guest and their organization can invite two representatives.

A number of chapters are nominating their members for the Ontario Volunteer Service Awards - in fact four members from the Provincial Executive Committee received their Ontario Volunteer Service Award this past April. We plan to nominate others for 2018.

You can nominate up to 6 chapter members for the Ontario Volunteer Service Awards. This award recognizes volunteers for providing committed and dedicated service to an organization. Adults are recognized by the length of time they've volunteered with one organization, ranging from five to 65 years of continuous service.

Annual Reports



At the April 2017 Provincial Annual Meeting **South Central Area Vice-President Sheila DeJaegher** presented the 2016 Annual Report on behalf of the Officers and Convenors. Thanks to your efforts we had an exceptionally productive year.

The following is part of her speech. "As a Past Citizenship Officer, I will start with this year's newest Provincial Life Member and **Citizenship Officer Caroline Rodgers**'s report. Chapters reported 246,179 volunteer hours. This is an increase of almost

29,500 volunteer hours from 2015. A total value of over \$52,000 was given to Citizenship Programs. This has almost doubled from the previous year.

Communications Officer Elanor Brodie reported a total value of over \$95,000 worth of promotional marketing. This is an increase of \$30,000 from the 2015 report. Social Media has had a tremendous impact on our culture, in business, on the world-at-*large* and given IODE more exposure.

Helen Danby, Education Officer reported over \$287,000 for a Total Value of Education Programs between the categories of "assistance to local students" and "local schools" and "other Education work outside of schools" received the addition growth of \$70,000 in contrast from the 2015 report. Norma Chicoine reported over \$12,500 expended to Adopted Classes in Northern Ontario and Labrador – this was a \$2,000 increase.

Services Officer Virginia Reade reported over \$772,000 of Total Value of Services Programs for 2016. Yes another increase - \$33,000 more than the 2015 Annual Report. The services department is very thankful for all of the items that the chapters send to the packing room – I encourage you to visit our office to see how full our shelves are before a packing and how empty they are after a packing.

Provincial Membership Officer Shirley Ann Elms's report had good news and bad news. With the disbandments and loss of members she reported 1,263 IODE members, a decrease of 67 members. The good news was that the two chapters amalgamated and received their new charter. Welcome IODE City of Lakes in Sudbury. We welcomed 2 new chapters, IODE Ubique in Toronto and IODE Headwaters in Orangeville. We welcome these ladies to IODE.

Remember this annual report is a permanent record of our accomplishments for 2017. Be proud of what together we can do, to better our communities, assist those in need and support each other.

It is an honour and a pleasure to say congratulations to all IODE Ontario chapters and their members for helping others."
