# **From Primary Chapters**

Thirty-eight primary chapter secretary reports were received. The majority of chapters were able to enjoy hybrid monthly meetings. Throughout the year, chapters were able to meet four to twelve times.

Fundraising events were held frequently with most chapters' activities back to pre-COVID times. IODE Ontario chapters had many creative ideas to raise funds for their projects. The following are some of the ways and means they used to fundraise for their causes:

- events: garage sales, craft/bake sales, bazaars, quilt shows, Christmas home tours, BBQs, walk-a-thons, consignment shops, afternoon teas, game nights, fashion shows, pancake breakfasts, soup fests and FundScrip
- **sales of various items:** DIY soup kits, baked goods, preserves, gift cards, chocolates, spring annual flowers, poinsettias, books and Christmas planters
- **annual events:** sales of flowers, chocolates, pies, butter tarts, soups, home preserves, books and crafts
- **other:** raffles, 50/50s, bingos, auctions, freewill donations, grants, personal member donations

Many chapters continued with their annual activities and the funds raised were donated to:

Grooming bags were assembled and donated to remote northern communities, hospitals, shelters and the homeless. Donations also included educational awards at all academic levels and assistance for literacy and mental health programs in the communities. The primary chapters' generosity also supported Provincial and National IODE programs such as Canadian Disaster Fund, Toys for the North, Snack Pack, Footwear for Kids, Services Shipping, Donors Circle, Together for Tomorrow and IODE Lucy Morrison Memorial Fund for Education.

Across the province, primary chapters became known generally for their good works and what they do in their communities.

**IODE Angela Bruce Chapter,** Oakville, 90<sup>th</sup> Anniversary, primarily raised funds from their Op Shop for which they were well known in the community.

**IODE Bemersyde Chapter,** Campbellford, 105<sup>th</sup> Anniversary, collected food for the foodbank as part of King Charles III "The Big Help Out". They hosted a concert and dance to kick-off the 105<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. Part of the proceeds were donated to the local hospital's CT Scanner campaign.

**IODE Captain Garnet Brackin Chapter,** Chatham, had members volunteer to teach water safety to grade school children during the Chatham-Kent Water Festival. Free Skating was sponsored to allow students to attend four free weekend skating sessions. During a Socktober Project members donated paired new socks for women, men and superhero socks for children. Through the School Library Books project the chapter donated to five secondary schools, *Weird Rules to Follow!*, the IODE Violet Downey Award book and 17 grade schools received *Professor Goose Debunks Goldie Locks & the Three Bears*, the IODE Jean Throop Award book.

**IODE Honourable Malcolm Cameron Chapter,** Sarnia, supported and sponsored a local shelter by participating in the Canadian National's Coldest Night of the Year Walk. Hundreds of beer cans, wine and liquor bottles were collected from family, friends and neighbours for a very profitable return.

**IODE Kathleen Drope Chapter,** Toronto, supported 'Youth Without Shelter' through the 'Stay in School' program. Each graduate was honoured with a medallion and their name placed on a plaque at the residence. Prom tickets were provided for several students.

**IODE Kent Regiment Chapter,** Chatham,110<sup>th</sup> Anniversary, purchased a Remembrance Day Banner from the Legion's Memorial Banner Program honouring Cpl. Marshall C. DeJaegher of the 1<sup>st</sup> Hussars Regiment in WWII.

**IODE Laurentian Chapter**, Ottawa, held their 'Every Member Counts Campaign' over the first three months of 2023. Members were encouraged to donate funds themselves and seek donations from family and friends for a specific cause. The 14<sup>th</sup> annual Linden House Theatre Benefit Night was held. This year, during the Street Fest event three homes were open to the public.

**IODE Maple Leaf Chapter,** Goderich, donated substantial funds to update one palliative care room at a local hospital. The chapter commemorated 123 years of IODE by offering chocolates to customers and staff at the Op Shop. They also presented years of service pins to 11 members for 50, 30 and 5 years.

**IODE Margaret Stokes Chapter,** Petrolia, hosted a Quilt Show that was attended by people across south-western Ontario. A quilt raffle raised substantial funds for the chapter's 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary project in 2024. They worked collaboratively with the Legion for the Veterans' Christmas dinner.

**IODE Stirling Chapter,** St. Thomas, celebrated their 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary and donated to many organizations including the YMCA and a museum.

**IODE Susie Sorabji Chapter,** Uxbridge, laid a wreath on behalf of IODE at the cenotaph that was built in 1935 with funds raised by the first IODE chapter in Uxbridge. Local bookstore gift certificates were presented to grade 8 graduating classes of six elementary schools along with the presentation of letters of congratulations.

**IODE Trillium 2023 Chapter**, Virtual, was chartered June 2023. The first virtual chapter in Ontario had ten members. The initial project was sending 200 Christmas cards to Canadian Armed Forces overseas.

**IODE Val Griffiths Chapter,** Dorchester, celebrated their 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. Four members received Ontario Volunteer Services Awards. Years of service pins were presented to five members for 25 and 40 years. One member was awarded a Provincial Life Membership. Pill bottles were collected for Doctors Without Borders. Some members volunteered at the VON blood pressure clinic. Slings made for children and adults were donated to the hospital. One member trained in pet therapy spent time at local hospitals and nursing homes to brighten clients' day.

**IODE Victoria Guelph Chapter,** Guelph, donated to the Kiwanis Music Festival and the Royal Canadian Sea Cadets. As the oldest chapter in the city, founded in 1909, they are known for the Cross of Sacrifice cenotaph donated to the city in 1925.

**IODE Walter Baker Chapter,** Nepean/Kanata, celebrated their 35<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. Most of the founding members were present and recognized with a certificate and a rose. They gathered donations from two large stores and sorted, redistributed and delivered items to numerous charities.

**IODE White Cloud Chapter,** Wiarton, was the recipient of the 2023 Ontario Volunteer Service Award from the Town of South Bruce Peninsula. They also received Certificates of Recognition from the Bruce Grey Owen Sound MPP and MP. They made 23 quilts of which 15 were bed size and others that were crib and lap sizes.

**IODE Yellow Briar Chapter,** Orangeville, was known for their library basket fundraiser.

In summary, across the province, IODE members continued to have tremendous accomplishments in their communities.

# 103<sup>rd</sup> Provincial Annual Meeting (PAM)

In 2023, the annual meeting was held on Saturday, April 22, as a one-day event from 10:00 a.m. – 3:00 p.m. Once again, due to COVID concerns, the meeting was held virtually by Zoom. This year's theme was 'Celebrating You'. The meeting was well attended by 58 members from 21 primary chapters including nine first time attendees.

**Guest Speaker**: Detective Constable Phil Poirier of the Crimes Against Seniors Unit, Hamilton, spoke about Fraud and Cybercrime against older members of society. His detailed and informative presentation explained how unfortunately, women are the main targets.

**Helpful Hints Workshop for Small Chapters:** presented by Provincial First Vice-President and Membership Officer, Michelle Batty.

Membership is a crucial factor in keeping a chapter healthy. Sometimes, however, recruiting new members is difficult. The majority (35 of 45) primary chapters in Ontario had less than 20 members.

IODE's main focus is community involvement. By partnering with other service clubs or sharing meetings with another chapter, Presidents may take turns chairing the meeting. Chapter projects can be modified, reduced or retired while members still help their community.

Valuable contributions by chapter members change over the years. Giving of time is a precious gift, i.e. knitting and sewing items, preparing meals in food kitchens, reading to preschool children, visiting seniors, delivering magazines to long-term care homes and participating at citizenship court receptions.

## **Provincial Life Memberships**



This choice is an excellent reflection of the quality of children's literature that the award has come to represent.

There were 740 paid-up members in Ontario at 31 December 2023.

The Finance Committee met March 12, 2024 to review the 2023 audited financial statement and in November 2023 to prepare the budget for 2024. The committee endeavoured to be realistic in anticipating both revenue and expenditures. The Provincial Executive Committee approved the 2024 budget at the March 14, 2024 meeting. The 2024 Provincial Budget is on page 20 in this report for your information.

IODE Ontario is grateful for the generous donations from individuals and chapters to the IODE Donors Circle during 2023. Those donations of \$11,958 along with the investment income kept the operating deficiency of revenue over expenses to a minimum.

The Provincial Executive Committee continues to monitor operating expenses and implement cost savings where possible.

The investment portfolio of The Provincial Chapter of IODE Ontario realized an increase of \$49,106 in fair market value at 31 December 2023. The balance in the investment account was \$624,891 at 31 December 2023. We continue to receive excellent advice from investment advisor Yves Apel of CIBC Wood Gundy.

## FINANCIAL STATEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 2023

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## **INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT**

To the Members of the Provincial Chapter of IODE Ontario

## Qualified Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of IODE Ontario (the "organization"), which comprise the as at December 31, 2023, and the statement of revenue and expenses, statement of changes in net assets and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, except for the effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the organization as at December 31, 2023, and its results of operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations (ASNPO).

## **Basis for Qualified Opinion**

In common with many not-for-profit organizations, the organization derives revenue from donations and fundraising activities the completeness of which is not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the organization. Therefore, we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to fundraising or donation revenue, excess of revenues over expenses, and cash flows from operations for the years ended December 31, 2023 and 2022, current assets as at December 31, 2023 and 2022, and net assets as at January 1 and December 31 for both the 2023 and 2022 years. Our audit opinion on the financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2022 was modified accordingly because of the possible effects of this limitation in scope.

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the organization in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with ASNPO, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the organization's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the organization or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so. Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the organization's financial reporting process.

## **INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT, continued**

## Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements. As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the organization's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the organization's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the organization to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

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## IODE ONTARIO NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2023

## **1. NATURE OF OPERATIONS**

The organization was established to improve quality of life for children, youth and those in need through educational, social service and citizenship programs. It is incorporated by letters patent as a corporation without share capital under laws of Ontario and is a registered charity under the Income Tax Act. IODE Canada holds both the letters patent and registered charity number for the organization.

## 2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

These financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for notfor-profit organizations. The significant policies are detailed as follows:

## (a) FUND ACCOUNTING RESTRICTED

The Operating Fund reports the organization's administrative activities and consequently reports the revenues and expenses related to the collection of unrestricted fees and contributions. The restricted funds report contributions for which the use is restricted by the municipal and local chapters, along with related investment income earned on these funds. The endowment fund reports contributions with the stipulation that the capital amount be permanently retained. Investment income earned on this fund is reported in the restricted funds.

## (b) REVENUE RECOGNITION

Revenues are recorded on an accrual basis. Unrealized gains and losses on held-for trading financial assets are included as investment income and recognized as revenue in the statement of revenues and expenses.

## (c) CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

Cash and cash equivalents include cash and short-term investments with maturities of three months or less from their date of acquisition, which are readily convertible into a known amount of cash, and are subject to an insignificant risk to changes in their fair value.

## (d) INVESTMENTS

All investments are classified as held-for-trading. These investments are measured at fair value with gains and losses recognized in revenue in the statement of revenues and expenses. Any unrealized holding gains and losses related to held-for-trading investments are included in investment income. The quoted market price was used to record the fair value of the financial instruments held as investments.

## (e) CAPITAL ASSETS

The organization expenses its capital assets. During the current year no capital expenditures were incurred (2022 - Nil).

## (f) FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The organization's financial instruments consist of cash, accounts receivable, investments, and accounts payable. Unless otherwise noted it is management's opinion that the organization is not exposed to significant interest, currency or credit risks.

## NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2023

## 2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, continued

## (g) IMPAIRMENT OF LONG-LIVED ASSETS

The organization tests for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount of the assets may not be recoverable. Recoverability is assessed by comparing the carrying amount to the projected undiscounted future net cash flows the long-lived assets are expected to generate through their direct use and eventual disposition. When a test for impairment indicates that the carrying amount of an asset is not recoverable, an impairment loss is recognized to the extent carrying value exceeds its fair value.

## (h) MEASUREMENT UNCERTAINTY

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-forprofit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amount of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. These estimates are reviewed periodically, and as adjustments become necessary they are reported in income in the period in which they become known.

## (i) DONATED MATERIALS AND SERVICES

The organization does not record the value of donated materials and services as the fair market value can not be reasonably estimated.

## **10. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS**

The organization is exposed to various risks through its financial instruments, which consist of cash and cash equivalents, accounts receivable, accounts payable, accrued liabilities and portfolio investments.

## (a) MARKET RISK

Market risk is the risk that the value of a financial instrument will fluctuate as a result of changes in market prices, whether the factors are specific to the instrument or all instruments traded in the market.

## (b) CREDIT RISK

The organization does have credit risk in accounts receivable. Credit risk is the risk that one party to a transaction will fail to discharge an obligation and cause the other party to incur a financial loss. The organization reduces its exposure to credit risk by performing credit valuations on a regular basis, granting credit upon a review of the credit history of the applicant and creating an allowance for bad debts when applicable. The organization maintains strict credit policies and limits in respect to counterparties. In the opinion of management, the credit risk exposure to the organization is low and is not material.

## (c) LIQUIDITY RISK

Liquidity risk is the risk the company may not be able to meet its obligations. The organization has a comprehensive plan in place to meet their obligations as they come due which is primarily from cash flow from operations.

## (d) INTEREST RATE RISK

The organization is exposed to interest rate risk on its fixed and floating interest rate financial instruments held. Fixed-rate instruments subject the organization to a fair value risk while the floating rate instruments subject it to a cash flow risk.

It is management's opinion that the organization is not exposed to significant risk arising from these financial instruments.

# ARCHIVES

## by Helen Danby

During 2023, the archivist updated many active chapter member databases. The most intensive work was the transfer of data from the *Globe and Mail* archived articles to the Toronto chapter database. This portion of the project provided an additional 5,000 names of Toronto IODE members. In 2022, the database contained 52,800 names, presently there are over 58,000 IODE members recorded.

Recording of all 12,000 entries that were downloaded last year from the *Globe and Mail* Archives from 1900 to 1965 continued. All information was sorted by chapter. There were 194 chapters recorded in Toronto, excluding the IODE Toronto Municipal Chapter. Presently the data for 137 Chapters are recorded. Many chapters continue to miss several years as their records are elusive. To date, over 9,900 members' names were recorded for these chapters.

The Provincial President continued to find the members' database invaluable when she was able to personalize letters of IODE service to primary chapter members who were recognized.

A display for the CNE attracted much attention on Military Day and was appreciated by many veterans. The display showed the efforts of IODE women during the wars, as well as the cenotaphs and hospitals that they built after WWI.

In October, an IODE display at the 'Celebrating Women in Business' event held in Forest brought interest to the retired **IODE Trillium Chapter** in Forest, that was active from 1935 to 1990. Former members were able to assist with the completion of the chapter's member database by supplying first names of the women.

Archive Inquiries:

- Bob Everett contacted IODE Ontario regarding a silver plate that was donated to his grandmother Mrs. J.S. Everett by the members of the Jeffery Hale Barland Chapter in 1926. The plate is displayed in the National Office and is in excellent shape.
- A lamp that had been 'a gift from Alexander Graham Bell Chapter', Brantford, was purchased from a person living in Ottawa and now is showcased at the Provincial Office.

The archivist encourages chapters and members who have past membership lists prior to 2000 to contact her to assist in completing the database for their chapter or any past chapters to which they may have belonged.

Forty-one chapters responded by sending report forms, some of which were marked 'no report'. Chapters continue to underestimate or not track at all, their volunteer hours. Chapters did a much better job of tracking their volunteer hours which were over 16,000 more than last year.

## Provincial Chapter of IODE Ontario, Hamilton

The IODE Ontario Police Community Relations Award for 2023 was presented to Constable Elana Durtnall of the Southern Georgian Bay Detachment who has been working in the Community Safety Officer/School Officer position since October 2021. In this assignment, she interacted with community partners and key stakeholders, communicated effectively to build trust and confidence in policing, and promoted and improved programming with local schools, groups, and committees. Elana did this successfully by immersing herself in the community she polices and resides in, both on and off duty.

A brief Remembrance Day service was held at the November meeting. A letter was read from the mother of a service man who died after returning from a Peacekeeping mission. Two minutes of silence was held at 11:00 a.m. The service concluded by reading the 4<sup>th</sup> stanza of the poem 'For the Fallen' by Laurence Binyon.

'They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old: Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning We will remember them.' A wreath was laid at the Gore Park Remembrance Day Service by Christina Junega of **IODE Dr. Elizabeth Bagshaw Chapter**, Hamilton, on behalf of the Ontario chapter and President Helen Danby.

**IODE 48<sup>th</sup> Highlanders Chapter,** Toronto, had 4,112 volunteer hours. One United Nations Peacekeeper bar was given in 2023. A wreath was laid at the Regimental Remembrance Service. Many members have volunteered at the 48<sup>th</sup> Museum, the Ontario Regiment Tank Museum, the Warriors Day Parade Council of Toronto, many church functions, and the Ontario Model Soldier Society. Donations were sent to northern communities and activity kits were given to the Barrie Native Friendship Centre. Soldiers deployed overseas received Christmas parcels. A family newly arrived in Canada received small appliances through individual members' donations.

**IODE Angela Bruce Chapter,** Oakville, had 5,410 volunteer hours. Friends of the chapter recorded 1,826 hours to IODE. Members attended the Remembrance Day Service at the Oakville cenotaph and laid a wreath.

**IODE Bemersyde Chapter,** Campbellford, had 6,368 volunteer hours. Christmas carolling at a local long term care facility provided entertainment to the residents. Other activities included sending Christmas cards to troops overseas, giving activity bags for young children to the local hospital, donations of books to the local library and school, connecting with shut-ins, driving citizens to appointments, working at two food banks, maintaining the IODE Parkette along the Trent Canal at the entrance to Campbellford and many other activities. A wreath was presented at the Remembrance Day service. For the first time, six members were nominated for the Ontario Volunteer Service Awards (OVSA). Lisa Cossar was given an OVSA for her work by the Norwood Horticultural Society.

**IODE Bertha Cane Chapter,** Newmarket, had 500 volunteer hours. A wreath was presented at the Remembrance Day Service.

**IODE Bridlewood Chapter,** Toronto, had 313 volunteer hours.

**IODE Captain Garnet Brackin Chapter,** Chatham, had 787 volunteer hours. Money was given to support the Kiwanis Music Festival and the annual Water Festival which teaches grade 4 and 5 students about environmental awareness regarding water. A wreath was laid at the local Remembrance Day Service.

**IODE Captain Hooper Chapter,** Carleton Place, had 3,910 volunteer hours. The chapter is a member of the Carleton Place & Beckwith Historical Society. A wreath was laid at the Remembrance Day Service at the Carleton Place Cenotaph on November 11<sup>th</sup>. Christmas cards were distributed to 110 people through the Meals on Wheels program.

**IODE Catherine McVean Chapter,** Dresden, had 2,165 volunteer hours. The chapter continued to support a large number of Thai migrant workers at two local greenhouses to make them feel welcome and a part of the community. A major development was the establishment of a Buddhist Temple in nearby Thamesville. The workers were also included in Dresden Shines, a Christmas celebration. Members supported the migrant workers to learn English and thereby facilitate permanent residency.

**IODE Confederation Chapter,** Ridgetown, had 1,560 volunteer hours. The chapter was active in the community again this past year. Good citizenship awards were given to students graduating from grade 8, the chapter members maintained the grounds in Cenotaph Park, and laid a wreath on Remembrance Day. Financial support was provided for several community agencies including Four Counties Health Services, The Chatham-Kent Hospice Foundation, the Public Library summer reading program, and providing eyeglasses for seniors. Guest speakers were booked for five chapter meetings on a wide range of topics from horticulture to health services.

**IODE Dr. Elizabeth Bagshaw Chapter,** Hamilton, had 2,225 volunteer hours. The chapter displayed the table standards at meetings and many members flew the Canada flag at their homes and cottages.

**IODE Dr. Herbert A. Bruce Chapter,** North Bay, had 5,619 volunteer hours. Donations were made to several local organizations including the Canadian Forces Base North Bay Family Resource Centre to help military staff transition to civilian life, the St. Brice's Friday Teen lunch program and the Youth Food Pantry. Good citizenship awards were given at five local secondary schools.

**IODE Dr. Innis Mary MacDonald Chapter,** Markham, had 846 volunteer hours. The chapter donated to a local Indigenous community.

**IODE Dr. Norman A. McCormick Chapter,** Windsor, had 1,795 volunteer hours.

**IODE Edith Benson Chapter,** London, had 812 volunteer hours. The chapter supported Youth Opportunities Unlimited with hats and mitts among other items. Assistance was given to SunFest, a well-known annual music and culture festival. Members helped look after the cenotaph and laid a wreath for Remembrance Day.

**IODE Eldon House Chapter,** London, had 2,858 volunteer hours. Citizenship activities within the chapter included senior safety measures and awareness of scams, the importance of vaccines, the importance of socialization to prevent isolation and improve mental health, and the importance of the Green Bin program and recycling.

**IODE Elizabeth Barrett Browning Chapter,** Sudbury, donated to the Royal Canadian Legion Branch 564.

**IODE Errol Egremont Chapter,** Sarnia, had 7,961 volunteer hours. One hundred and fifty cards were signed for the Canadian Armed Forces overseas. Magazines and books were provided for the Family Court waiting room. The five finalist books for the IODE Jean Throop Book Award were donated to the YMCA Learning Centre and Literacy Lambton. A wreath was laid at the Camlachie cenotaph for Remembrance Day. At a chapter meeting a guest speaker talked about environmental issues and biodiversity in Sarnia.

**IODE Freelton Chapter,** Freelton, had 1,079 volunteer hours. Donations were made to the Balaclava Elementary School, a games night fundraiser, the local food bank and an adopt-asenior program.

**IODE Headwaters Chapter,** Orangeville, had 1,407 volunteer hours. The chapter donated to several area agencies including the food bank, an early years' program, a Christmas in the Park fundraiser and Stockings for Seniors. IODE Jean Throop Book Award winning books were donated to local libraries.

**IODE Holland Landing Chapter,** Holland Landing, had 570 volunteer hours. Chapter members delivered boxes of groceries to families in need, raised money for a temporary shelter through raffles and 50:50 draws and volunteered at local schools.

**IODE Honourable Malcolm Cameron Chapter,** Sarnia, had 4,048 volunteer hours. The chapter donated scarves to Indigenous communities. Funding was given to Nightlight Sarnia, a drop-in centre for unhoused people where they can receive food, clothing, companionship and shelter for a few hours. Toys, books, magazines and colouring books were donated to the Family Court waiting room. Guest speakers from the community increased awareness of needs and provided the chapter with ideas for supporting areas of greatest need. Over 300 Christmas cards were sent to troops overseas. A wreath was laid at the cenotaph and a donation made to the Poppy Fund.

**IODE Kathleen Drope Chapter,** Toronto, had 3,894 volunteer hours. For the 12<sup>th</sup> year, Citizenship Awards consisting of a certificate and a book about the youth movement on climate change were presented to four grade 5 students at a local school. The awards were presented at an assembly where the grades 4, 5 and 6 students witnessed the presentation and learned about IODE. The students were very interested during the question-and-answer section. Many members volunteered outside of IODE and resumed doing so as COVID restrictions were removed.

**IODE Kent Regiment Chapter,** Chatham, had 3,000 volunteer hours. Chapter members are no longer able to do active fundraising, therefore they contributed through volunteer activities. These activities included driving people to appointments, getting groceries for shut-ins, comforting those who are dying, making funeral lunches and helping the local priest with masses at nursing homes. A banner was purchased from the Legion to honour the service of Cpl. Marshall C. DeJaegher of the 1<sup>st</sup> Hussars Regiment, who was among those who landed on Juno Beach on D-Day, June 06, 1944. The banner was hung in downtown Chatham from Labour Day to Remembrance Day. A wreath was presented at the cenotaph for Remembrance Day. The 'Gathering our Heroes' project continued to be updated with new information.

**IODE Laurentian Chapter,** Ottawa, had 12,282 volunteer hours. In April, the chapter staged a 'Lady Grey Tea' which raised money for a women's shelter through a silent auction. In September, the second annual StreetFest raised a substantial amount of money for the Inuuqatigiit charity which supports Inuit families in Ottawa. These funds supported the Childcare and Youth Programmes with clothing, gift cards for food and the purchase of cultural material from the North.

**IODE Lord Dufferin Chapter,** Orangeville, had 1,991 volunteer hours. The chapter's annual award went to the man who runs the local theatre. He helped members of the community feel empowered through theatre.

**IODE Lorraine Chapter,** Ottawa, had 2,256 volunteer hours.

**IODE Maple Leaf Chapter,** Goderich, had 8,000 volunteer hours. A citizenship award was given to a local veteran for his long service to the Legion and his service during WWII. A local man who has been instrumental in setting up the chapter's gmail account and on-line community funding was given a gift as he declined a citizenship award. Members laid a wreath during the Remembrance Day Ceremony at the town cenotaph. Money was donated to the IODE Ontario Police Community Relations Award.

**IODE Margaret Stokes Chapter,** Petrolia, had 10,281 volunteer hours. In November, 465 white crosses were displayed at the cenotaphs of three local cemeteries in honour of the veterans buried there. At a monthly meeting, a veteran spoke about the often-difficult transition back to civilian life after time in the armed services. Members of the chapter assisted in providing a Christmas dinner at the local Legion for local veterans and their caregivers. On Remembrance Day, a wreath was laid at the Petrolia cenotaph in Victoria Park. A banner was hung downtown in honour of veteran Sonny Moore the late husband of a member. Many local sports and cultural organizations for youth were supported by chapter donations. Hot chocolate with marshmallows and cookies were served at the Christmas in the Park celebration.

**IODE Rouge Valley Chapter,** Ajax, had 149 volunteer hours.

**IODE Royal Wyndham Chapter,** Guelph, had 804 volunteer hours. The chapter attended the Remembrance Day Service at the IODE Cross of Sacrifice with members of IODE Victoria Guelph Chapter and local politicians. A donation was made to the Guelph Legion Poppy Fund. The ongoing exploration of Provincial IODE Chapters across the prairies and Ontario was concluded, and chapter members appreciated the stories of achievements and challenges that are part of the IODE story. Meetings focused on topics such as cyber-security for seniors and how to help maintain mental processing abilities for a long and active life.

**IODE Stirling Chapter,** St. Thomas, had 2,094 volunteer hours. The flag was carried, and a wreath laid at the Remembrance Day Service at the cenotaph. Donations were made to community services and the local music festival through money raised at the bingo hall.

**IODE Susie Sorabji Chapter**, Uxbridge, had 750 volunteer hours. The chapter applied twice to the local 100 Women Who Care organization but were not successful. Food was prepared for the local soup kitchen and the money raised was donated to the Food Bank. Baby clothes and supplies collected by members were donated to the Sunrise Pregnancy and Family Support Services. The chapter Citizenship Officer marched in the Remembrance Day parade and laid a wreath at the cenotaph that was built in 1935 with funds donated by the first chapter in Uxbridge, **IODE John Peel Chapter**.

**IODE The Princes Richard and Michael Chapter,** Kitchener, had 1,100 volunteer hours. A Canadian flag donated by a member was presented at the Kitchener cenotaph during the Remembrance Day Ceremony. Local IODE chapters contributed to the construction of the cenotaph in the early 1900s.

**IODE Trillium 2023 Chapter,** Virtual, had 918 volunteer hours in the first six months since the charter was granted on June 23, 2023. Two hundred Christmas cards were sent to Canadian troops via the Military Family Resource Centre in Belleville. Some of these cards were also signed by women who visited the IODE booth at the 'Celebrating Women in Business' event held in Forest.

**IODE Val Griffiths Chapter**, Dorchester, had 2,726 volunteer hours. The chapter is committed to environmental issues and solicited community support to reduce the environmental footprint by supporting a Canadian business that makes environmentally friendly laundry and cleaning products. The chapter fundraised by selling these products. Members turned milk bags into child bed mats which were sent to Africa. Wreaths were laid at the Dorchester Cenotaph and the cenotaph at Parkwood Hospital in London during Remembrance Day Ceremonies. The ceremonies in London, Dorchester and Goderich were attended by many members. Cards were made and delivered to the veterans in Parkwood Hospital.

**IODE Victoria Guelph Chapter,** Guelph, had 1,354 volunteer hours. Members laid a wreath at the IODE Cross of Sacrifice on Remembrance Day with the assistance of the Royal Canadian Sea Cadet Corps. Local dignitaries and members of the public also attended. A donation was made to the Sea Cadets and to the Royal Canadian Legion Branch 234 in Guelph.

**IODE Walter Baker Chapter,** Nepean/Kanata, had 4,240 volunteer hours.

**IODE West Gwillimbury Chapter,** Bradford, had 500 volunteer hours. One Community Citizen award was presented.

**IODE White Cloud Chapter,** Wiarton, had 1,456 volunteer hours. A wreath was laid at the Remembrance Day Ceremony and a donation was made to the Girl Guides.

Connecting via Zoom enabled established and new IODE members to attend their meetings regardless of geographic location. Through website promotion, the province's first virtual chapter IODE Trillium 2023 was chartered. The second edition provincial bookmarks were widely distributed to primary chapters whose members handed them out locally and when travelling. This simple gesture and the ever enthusiastic conversations that ensued sparked interest to join IODE. Primary chapters used their Facebook and community pages as well as those of their community partners to advertise and report their events and ongoing projects. Community partners were thanked through emails, hand-written notes and social media. Many primary chapters distributed free National and Provincial brochures at events including education awards and cheque presentations, community fundraisers and celebrations. Most chapters no longer have a brochure because of expensive printing, and because of the proven success of free promotion of IODE membership and events on social media. Websites were valued using www.siteprice.org.

**IODE 48<sup>th</sup> Highlanders Chapter**, Toronto, actively promoted their activities on their Facebook account and through their Regiment's website, the 48<sup>th</sup> Highlanders of Canada. The Regiment, which is their community partner, was thanked via donations to their messes and through invitations to chapter events. Photos and articles were regularly submitted to the 48<sup>th</sup> Highlanders of Canada for their Regimental Family newsletters.

**IODE Angela Bruce Chapter**, Oakville, promoted their popular Opportunity Shop largely through their Facebook and Instagram pages. They displayed business cards and provincial brochures in the shop window for distribution to customers.

**IODE Bemersyde Chapter**, Campbellford, made greater use of community and chapter Facebook pages, local newspapers and radio to promote their activities. Their Tree of Tribute at the Dresden Shines tree lighting ceremony, school awards given at graduation night, donations to school projects and presentations for children's special programs at the library were acknowledged on site. All events were posted on the chapter and community partner Facebook pages and published in several local news outlets. They received further advertising on the town website and digital sign in the town centre.

**IODE Confederation Chapter**, Ridgetown, used their Facebook page to advertise fundraisers, events, and meeting activities. Acknowledgements of donations were posted on Facebook as well. Donations from charity gaming funds when promoted on their Facebook earned the chapter additional funds. The chapter advertised frequently in their local newspaper, the *Ridgetown Independent*. The press was invited to events and donation presentations where they took photos for publication, including those submitted by the chapter.

**IODE Dr. Herbert A. Bruce Chapter**, North Bay, took advantage of their Victory Thrift Shop to highlight their 90 years of working together in their community through an eye catching window display of photos and chapter items. They received positive comments and questions from their customers. Military cadet groups assisted with material for a Remembrance Day window and were pleased with the community exposure given to them. The chapter included business cards with their donations such as afghans to the North Bay Regional Health Centre Foundation.

**IODE Dr. Innis Mary MacDonald Chapter,** Markham, liaised with and received funding from '100 Women Who Care', Markham, which they used to support the 'Guardians of the Children' Toronto Chapter, a group that helps children dealing with abuse.

**IODE Dr. Norman A. McCormick Chapter,** Windsor, gave each member provincial bookmarks to distribute to others. They met monthly via Zoom and in person.

**IODE Edith Benson Chapter**, London, maintained its volunteerism working with **IODE Eldon House Chapter** to meet the needs of those at the South London Neighbourhood Resource Centre.

**IODE Eldon House Chapter**, London, held their annual book sale which was well advertised with posters, Facebook notifications, and a digital billboard sponsored by Royal LePage Treyland Realty. The South London Neighborhood Resource Centre's appreciation for assistance from the chapter was written up in their annual report and on their Facebook page. The National Service Dog program acknowledged the support of the chapter as a sponsor on their website. Whenever they were in public or recruiting a member, they distributed brochures to individuals to inform them of the good works of IODE, with a specific emphasis on their chapter.

**IODE Elizabeth Barrett Browning Chapter**, Sudbury, launched a chapter website in October which they used along with their Facebook page to boost promotion of their activities. They partnered with the Legion as well as a semi-pro basketball team that donated tickets to help raise money for chapter projects. All sponsors received thank you cards. The chapter used electronic storage for their chapter history.

**IODE Errol Egremont Chapter**, Sarnia, made excellent use of free advertising through Facebook, radio broadcasts, and newspaper articles and photos which promoted upcoming events. They were recognized on the City of Sarnia website for a 'Go Green Spotlight Award' received on Earth Day from the city. They used in-person opportunities such as the IODE booth at the CNE with junior IODE members present, and the 'Celebrating Women in Business' event in Forest to advertise IODE. The public was invited to participate in Citizenship's acts of kindness initiative by signing Christmas cards for the troops overseas.

**IODE Festival Jubilee Chapter,** Stratford, utilized their website to raise money annually with the click of a few buttons.

**IODE Freelton Chapter**, Freelton, got together twice for lunch and allowed time to socialize at each of five meetings held. They partnered with **IODE Dr. Elizabeth Bagshaw Chapter**, Hamilton, for a game night fundraiser at the provincial office where they shared the proceeds.

**IODE Holland Landing Chapter**, Holland Landing, promoted their activities on Instagram. The chapter members corresponded through email and stayed connected via Zoom meetings.

**IODE Honourable Malcolm Cameron Chapter**, Sarnia, promoted their activities through several Facebook pages, including IODE Friends and those of nearby chapters. The advertising drew a wide audience for attendance at their events. Personal phone calls and emails furthered the awareness of their many activities. They partnered with nine businesses that were thanked for their assistance.

**IODE Kathleen Drope Chapter**, Toronto, activities were promoted in part on the website of 'The Redwood', a safe haven for women, to which the chapter donated.

**IODE Kent Regiment Chapter**, Chatham, was named a partner of the 'Gathering Our Heroes' website. With the added help of a newspaper article in *Chatham This Week*, a researcher from France, made a remarkable connection with the family of a Chatham Kent hero. Through the website, the family was notified of a memorial planned for 2025 for airmen who lost their lives in northern France in World War II. The chapter's history which included scrapbooks and 1960s copies of *Echoes* was archived with IODE Ontario.

**IODE Laurentian Chapter**, Ottawa, utilized all forms of media to advertise and promote their events. A Facebook boost ad for the second 'StreetFest' helped increase attendance. This resulted in greater financial returns, a portion of which was put towards their communal project. The chapter tagged the social media pages of their community partners and beneficiaries which increased awareness of IODE. They made a point of publicly thanking sponsors and donors on their website and in social media. The sponsors were named using their company logo in event brochures for each IODE activity.

**IODE Lord Dufferin Chapter**, Orangeville, had four promotional stories published in the local newspaper about fundraisers and donation presentations to three charities which they support; the local hospital, food bank, and library. The chapter partnered with the Rotary Club to sell water and pop at the club's annual Ribfest. The local theatre donated seats for members to sell which allowed for an in-person opportunity to talk to theatre goers about joining IODE.

**IODE Lorraine Chapter**, Ottawa, was known in the community for its charitable services. Money was raised at luncheons and auctions. Members had their minutes sent electronically and one member received them in the mail. They kept in touch through email, phone, meetings, and worked together on 'sew' days.

**IODE Margaret Stokes Chapter**, Petrolia, extensively used numerous community partners, IODE brochures and bookmarks to promote and advertise their activities. Printed articles about events and presentations, and ads with meeting information and contacts were published in *The Independent, Sarnia Observer, Daytripper, and Coffee News*. The chapter's donations were promoted through social media, such as the Facebook pages of the Community Refrigerator and the Town of Petrolia.

**IODE Maple Leaf Chapter**, Goderich, used a variety of media platforms such as Facebook, (updated daily), Instagram, newspapers, a new magazine *Goderich Sun* and banners in their Op Shop to advertise events. The *Goderich Sun* published an article about the chapter's cheque presentation for the Palliative Care Unit of their hospital. They had a dedicated page on Facebook to promote membership with a clear message regarding IODE, what they do, when they meet, and the expected time commitments. Their community partners such as the Legion were acknowledged on the chapter Facebook and Instagram pages. The IODE flag was flown at the cenotaph on Remembrance Day.

**IODE Rouge Valley Chapter**, Pickering, held a bingo licence with the City of Pickering. The members volunteered at Pickering Delta Bingo to raise funds for their charitable projects each of which required annual approval by the city. The chapter shared the bingo revenue from their community partner equally with **IODE Bridlewood Chapter**, Toronto.

**IODE Royal Wyndham Chapter**, Guelph, distributed their minutes via email to their members. They gathered at meetings and when there was not a formal meeting, they enjoyed getting together at arranged social events.

**IODE Stirling Chapter**, St. Thomas, partnered with Charity Bingo Jackpot Time to raise money each month for their donations to local charities. Photos were taken for the Charity Bingo Facebook page and website to promote the chapter's cheque presentations. At each of these events, the chapter distributed national and provincial brochures. **IODE Susie Sorabji Chapter**, Uxbridge, promoted their activities in the Uxbridge news media, including the local newspaper which highlighted the work of volunteers in the town's service clubs. The chapter inserted IODE bookplates in the books that won the IODE Jean Throop Book Award and the IODE Violet Downey Award. These books were donated to the local library. The chapter's school awards were viewed by wide audiences at graduation and commencement ceremonies. Members set up a chapter display in the Fantasy of Lights in Elgin Park, Uxbridge as part of a fundraiser for the local Optimist Club.

**IODE The Princes Richard and Michael Chapter**, Kitchener, met in person at four meetings. Several members took part in various Zoom meetings held by jurisdictional chapters. The chapter's annual donation of the Canadian flag at the Remembrance Day Ceremony in Kitchener was noted in the program.

**IODE Trillium 2023 Chapter**, virtual, the first provincial virtual chapter, signed their charter application electronically. It was granted in June via Zoom and announced in the Fall IODE Ontario Newsletter. Their motto, 'Making a Difference Virtually', was scripted into the newly launched Facebook page where photos of their initial citizenship and services projects were posted. To promote the new chapter, members at large were invited to the bestowal ceremony where National President Jane Cushing presented the first **IODE Trillium 2023 Chapter**, President Michelle Batty with the gavel.

**IODE Val Griffiths Chapter**, Dorchester, used their media platforms such as Facebook, Instagram and a chapter email address to advertise and promote their activities. They also partnered with the weekly community news publication, *The Signpost*. They posted their community partner fundraisers such as Purdy Chocolates on their Facebook page which allowed donors to directly purchase products online, with a percentage of proceeds going to the chapter. The IODE chapter banner was present at all community functions.

**IODE Victoria Guelph Chapter**, Guelph, maintained a scrapbook and written history.

**IODE Walter Baker Chapter,** Nepean/Kanata, promoted their annual garage sale on their Facebook page and a community representative promoted it in his weekly newsletter. They also advertised in a local magazine and put up posters. They distributed every type of IODE marketing material at their fundraiser event and meetings.

**IODE West Gwillimbury Chapter**, Bradford, preserved the chapter's history through their minutes.

**IODE White Cloud Chapter**, Wiarton, had two significant community partners that supported the chapter's activities. A photo and article of the chapter's 70 years of service in the community was published in the magazine, *Connecting the Sound*. The Wiarton Salvation Army Facebook page highlighted the donations made by the members which included 86 seniors Christmas gift bags. White Cloud held Zoom meetings which enabled all members to attend.

**IODE Yellow Briar Chapter,** Orangeville, advertised charitable events through the local newspaper, chapter and local garage sale Facebook pages, personal emails and signs provided by a local real estate agency. One of the community partners, 'Orange Threads', acknowledged Yellow Briar's benevolent gifts to seniors on their website.

**IODE Ontario Provincial Chapter**, Hamilton, quarterly newsletter was distributed via email to all primary chapter members. The section 'Chapters in the News' became very popular. A significant increase in primary chapter social media posts enabled the provincial chapter to capture many significant events such as celebrations, fundraisers and presentations for publication. Members were delighted to see chapters celebrated in photos and write-ups, which encouraged more members to submit articles for publication. Friday Facts were published on the IODE Ontario Facebook page as a means of hooking readers into the fascinating history of IODE women in Ontario and how their past connected to present day successes.

IODE Ontario's activities were also promoted and advertised through the newsletters. These included articles about the Services annual project and Provincial Annual Meeting details and inspiring reports from the officers of the Provincial Executive Committee such as Education scholarships which are funded by primary donations.

The IODE Ontario website enabled anyone to explore what IODE is about and inquiries into membership netted new members. The provincial Facebook page facilitated connections among members with up-to-date notices of primary chapter activities and photos so one could get to know faces and friends in IODE. News about primary chapters appeared in the IODE Ontario Instagram and X (formerly known as Twitter) pages as more chapters established accounts. Provincial President Helen Danby attended many chapter events to present service awards, celebrate chapter milestones and support their fundraisers.

Provincial bookmarks and brochures were a highly popular means of distributing IODE information in person. Over 500 bookmarks were given out in one day at the CNE IODE booth. In December, virtual Christmas cards were sent to all members from the office of IODE Ontario.

#### **Education Summary**

2023 was another amazing year for the primary chapters' education projects. There was an incredible array of ways that the local communities were supported. Over 180 individual students were awarded bursaries, scholarships or graduation awards, not including the classes and school libraries that were supported with new books for the students. Many youths were supported through IODE donations to camps, music festivals, libraries, museums, art programs, community outreach programs such as mental health, recreation and leadership activities. Chapters continued to donate to Provincial and National Funds such as IODE Lucy Morrison Memorial Fund, Labrabook, Labrador Bursary, Second War Memorial, and 'Share a Story-Bring a Book'.

**IODE 48<sup>th</sup> Highlanders Chapter**, Toronto, enjoyed presenting 20 activity kits to the Barrie Native Friendship Centre.

**IODE Angela Bruce Chapter,** Oakville, supported 10 students from high schools in Oakville with a bursary. Students at Sheridan College (Oakville Campus) received a Music/Theatre Award and Student Assistance Bursaries. Members also chose to support the IODE Lucy Morrison Memorial Fund.

**IODE Bemersyde Chapter**, Campbellford, presented nine graduation awards to grade 8 students at five area elementary schools. Their annual secondary awards consisted of two English awards and two bursaries. An extra bursary was awarded this year to commemorate the 105<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. Thirty-two 'Born to Read' bags with three books each were distributed to the three local libraries.

**IODE Bertha Cane Chapter**, Newmarket, generously donated funds to Provincial and National projects such as the IODE Lucy Morrison Memorial Fund, National Education and the Labrador Bursary Fund.

**IODE Bridlewood Chapter,** Toronto, donated funds to the Pickering Library for the Summer Reading Program. They also donated 20 books by Ontario authors to the Pickering Library.

They also sponsored the Chatham-Kent Secondary Students Choir to attend local and regional music festivals. The choir won gold at a MusicFest in Windsor!

**IODE Captain Hooper Chapter**, Carlton Place, presented two bursaries to graduating students from Notre Dame Catholic High School and Carleton Place High School at the June graduations. The chapter also donated to the Lanark County Therapeutic Riding Program to purchase new helmets for their participants. The 2023 IODE Jean Throop Book Award winning book, *Professor Goose Debunks Goldilocks and the Three Bears,* was donated to the Carleton Place Public Library.

**IODE Catherine McVean Chapter**, Dresden, supported the purchase of t-shirts for the entire student body at Dresden Area Central School for a school initiative to give all the students a sense of belonging. The chapter also supported the school healthy snacks program by donating grocery gift cards. The Dresden Library received a donation for their Summer Reading Program and two craft programs. Eighteen Awards of Excellence were presented to graduating students at the local elementary school, as well as a General Proficiency Award and a Geography Award. A wide variety of awards and IODE certificates were presented at the 56<sup>th</sup> Annual Lambton-Kent Composite School graduation ceremonies.

**IODE City of Lakes**, Sudbury, donated a bursary to the Nursing Program at Cambrian College and the chapter also donated books for children in a grade 3/4 class in memory of a chapter member.

**IODE Confederation Chapter,** Ridgetown, awarded the Isabel R. Pow Award and the Second World War Award to two graduating high school students. A student studying finance at the University of Guelph also received an award. The chapter supported several activities beyond the classroom, including the Kiwanis Music Festival and the high school curling team.

**IODE Dr. Elizabeth Bagshaw Chapter,** Hamilton, presented the Grade 8 Award at the graduation ceremony.

**IODE Dr. Herbert A. Bruce Chapter,** North Bay, donated to the North Bay Regional Science Fair which supported students attending the Canada Wide Science Fair in Edmonton. The chapter donated travel books to the local library in memory of a past member and was pleased to continue to offer scholarships and bursaries at Nipissing University and Canadore College.

**IODE Dr. Innis Mary MacDonald Chapter**, Markham, recognized a graduating student from Markham District High School with a History award.

The chapter's 'Book for Every Child' initiative was able to contribute 43 books for children up to 14 years old.

**IODE Elizabeth Barrett Browning Chapter**, Sudbury, presented two students from the Sudbury Learning Disabilities Association with awards to assist with their post-secondary studies.

**IODE Errol Egremont Chapter**, Sarnia, presented a grade 8 History award to a student at a local elementary school. The award included an Indigo gift certificate, IODE Award Certificate, letter of congratulations, IODE brochure and an IODE bookmark.

**IODE Festival Jubilee Chapter,** Stratford, provided awards to individual students who have overcome a personal adversity during their time at school. Three awards were given to high school students and the fourth was given to a Stratford Chef School graduate. The chapter also purchased taxi vouchers for a family who needed rides to and from school.

**IODE Freelton Chapter**, Freelton, donated snack bars, crackers and juice boxes to the local elementary school for the emergency snack program. Established in 1996 in honour of The Daughters of the Empire Club, Hamilton, Limited (1911-1996) in support of its belief that all students should have the opportunity to pursue their educational aspirations. A variable number of bursaries are granted to students in financial need. Preference is given to women enrolled in the Faculty of Business, DeGroote School of Business.

**IODE Randolph Churchill Chapter,** Blenheim, upon disbandment gave the Lambton-Kent District School Board approximately \$21,000. ### **Toronto Legacy Committee**

At the end of 2013, the IODE Toronto Municipal Chapter disbanded. Chapter funds were transferred to IODE Ontario, the jurisdictional chapter, with funds administered through the Toronto Legacy Fund. Margo MacKinnon was the convenor for 2023. The members of IODE Toronto chapters met several times to discuss the continuance of the Toronto Legacy Committee. It was decided that the committee be retired, and the funds disbursed as per the Toronto members' approval. A motion has been prepared and will be announced at the Provincial Annual Meeting in April 2024. The IODE Jean Throop Book Award and the 'Tech is Central' Award fell under the Toronto Legacy Committee (TLC) and were funded in 2023.

#### IODE Ontario Jean Throop Book Award, \$5,000

The IODE Jean Throop Book Award is given annually in recognition of quality children's literature. The author and/or the illustrator must be a Canadian citizen residing in Ontario. The value of the IODE Jean Throop Book Award is \$5,000. The recipients for 2022 were author Paulette Bourgeois for her book *Professor Goose Debunks Goldilocks and the Three Bears* and the book's illustrator Alex G. Griffiths. Professor Goose is Mother Goose's great-niece and takes the reader on a fun journey through a familiar fairy tale, but with a STEM focus. *Professor Goose Debunks Goldilocks and the Three Bears* was published by Penguin Random House.

#### 'Tech is Central' Award/ Central Technical Trade and Apprenticeship Award

Currently referred to as the 'Tech is Central' Award by the school, this award is valued at \$2,000 and is to be divided between two students enrolled in a recognized trade or apprenticeship program. The recipients of this award are chosen by the school. The names are forwarded to IODE and announced to the PEC each November. This award was not given in 2023.

### DONATIONS TO IODE ONTARIO FUNDS

### **IODE Lucy Morrison Memorial Fund for Education**

This fund was established in memory of a beloved IODE Provincial President. Thanks to the generosity of the IODE chapters who donate to the Lucy Morrison Memorial Education Fund, the bursaries are possible. Ontario chapters donated \$2,795 to this fund in 2023. Bursaries up to \$1,000 are awarded to post-secondary students at colleges and universities in Ontario who demonstrate financial need, have completed one full year of study and are Canadian citizens.

### **IODE Lucy Morrison Memorial Fund for Education:** Special Awards

Annually, Special Awards are made to students in specific fields. The appropriate universities, colleges and schools are asked to nominate students for these awards.

#### Ontario College of Art and Design University (OCADU): \$1,000

This is awarded to a second or third year student selected by the school. In 2023, the recipient was **Mahir Siraj**, a third-year student in the Drawing and Painting program.

### **IODE ONTARIO AWARDS**

### Provincial Chapter of Ontario IODE Bursary in Sociology, \$475

This bursary was established in 1997 as part of a Building Trust Endowment Campaign at Nipissing University in North Bay. The provincial government matched our contribution of \$5,000. The annual income is offered as a bursary to a full-time student in the third year of Bachelor of Arts, Sociology Program. The 2022 - 2023 recipient was Peter Wynne.

#### IODE Gladys Raiter Bursary for Graduate Study, \$5,000

This bursary, endowed by the Raiter family, is given to honour the memory of Gladys Raiter, an IODE member from the Kitchener-Waterloo region. It is offered to a graduate student at the University of Waterloo or Wilfrid Laurier University, or a resident of Kitchener-Waterloo studying at an accredited university elsewhere in Canada. Not awarded in 2023.

### IODE Ontario William Barrott Bursary, \$1,000

In 2018, IODE Ontario received a letter from Mr. William Barrott who lives in Anacortes, Washington, U.S.A. He reported that as an engineering student at Queen's University about 1958/59, he received a \$1,200 bursary from an IODE chapter in Windsor. He wrote, "Needless to say this was like a million dollars at the time and helped immensely with the costs of my education." He thought that it would be nice to help a student from the Windsor area with his/her education. A cheque of \$5,000 was enclosed.

IODE Ontario is grateful to Mr. Barrott who donated another \$2,000 in 2021 to continue the award to 2025. Arrangements with the Greater Essex County District School Board were completed to present this award beginning in 2019 to a graduating student from a Windsor secondary school who is enrolled in an engineering program at a Canadian university. The award was presented in 2023 to Sean Holmes, a graduate from Walkerville Collegiate Institute.

### IODE Ontario Lois Laughren Award for Women in STEM, \$10,000

Lois G. Laughren was President of IODE Ontario from 2001 to 2003. She had been a member of IODE since 1959 until her death in November 2010. As Lois and Ken had no children of their own, she gave generously to IODE. This donation allowed IODE Ontario to establish the STEM Award at Ryerson University for Women. This award is given to women who have completed at least one year of university and are pursuing a post-secondary education in the fields of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics.

The IODE Ontario Lois Laughren Award for Women in STEM was a donation of \$25,000 that was matched through Toronto Metropolitan University's PACE (President's Awards to Champion Excellence) fund, giving a total of \$50,000. The award is offered to five women at \$2,000 each (\$10,000 annually) for a period of five years. The first STEM awards were presented in September 2019.

The award recipients chosen by the university for 2023, expressed their gratitude as follows:

# WAR MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIPS

IODE Canada initiated the first War Memorial scholarships in 1918, honoring Canadians who sacrificed their lives for freedom and peace. Since the first scholarships were awarded in 1921, the IODE War Memorial scholars have made important contributions to Canada, in the world of medicine, science, business, politics and academia.

Today's applicants are reviewed on academic excellence, potential, in their second year of a PhD program at a Canadian or Commonwealth university and are Canadian citizens. IODE Ontario War Memorial selection committee considers applications of scholars who received their first degree from an Ontario university. Seventeen Ontario universities were notified of this offering by email to their Graduate offices.

The internal committee reviewed 45 applications and 20 were forwarded to the committee professors for input. The committee recommended the top 10 candidates to the National War Memorial Committee for final selection which included other provincial chapter candidates. The committee was impressed with the calibre of Ontario PhD scholars forwarded to IODE Canada 2023.

The War Memorial Committee was thanked for the intense time given to read and review the applications for the scholarships. The committee members were Helen Danby, Michelle Batty, Lisa Cossar, Jo Brodie, Professors Drs. Stephen Veldhuis, Robert Fraser and Kara Smith.

At the 2023 National Annual Meeting, IODE Canada announced the winners of the three recipients for the IODE War Memorial Scholarships. The value of the awards was \$15,000 each. The recipients were:

- Rohit Singla, currently pursuing an MD/PhD in Biomedical Engineering at the University of British Columbia

# ADOPTED SCHOOLS IN NORTHERN ONTARIO, NEWFOUNDLAND AND LABRADOR

In 2023, schools in Northern Ontario and Newfoundland and Labrador resumed classes. Sadly, because of the pandemic, some principals commented that the students were two to three years behind. As in past years, chapters in Ontario as well as individual members stepped up to meet the needs of these schools. Chapters continued to use Canada Post's free/discounted shipping every Tuesday in October to send their packages. Several classrooms bought supplies and then sent the bill to the IODE chapter. In return, chapters etransferred or sent a cheque to the school for those items, thereby reducing the cost of shipping. Chapters continued to look for companies that offered free shipping before sending supplies. One company, called First Book Canada, offered books at a discounted rate to children in need and First Nations schools along with free shipping. Education Officers were encouraged to buy a membership, free of charge, to help offset the cost of books and shipping and to let their schools know about this company so they too could sign up and receive discounted books. All these cost-saving measures helped chapters give needed school supplies to the children in both Northern Ontario and Newfoundland and Labrador.

IODE Ontario was this year's recipient of National's 'Share A Story...Bring A Book' project. All donations for this project went to three schools in Northern Ontario, namely Moosonee Public School in Moosonee, Thomas Fiddler Memorial School in Sandy Lake, and Samson Beardy Memorial School in Muskrat Dam. A variety of books including First Nations authors and stories were bought by these schools. One teacher thanked IODE by saying, "We are so excited about the prospect of new books to add to our school library and classroom libraries for the students to enjoy."

Fifteen chapters across Ontario, as well as two individuals supported forty-seven classes and 746 students in total for Northern Ontario and Newfoundland and Labrador, at a cost of \$16,657 in 2023.

Here is a breakdown of the Ontario chapters and individuals who have Adopted Classes and/or schools in both Northern Ontario and Newfoundland and Labrador in 2023.

**IODE Angela Bruce Chapter**, Oakville, supported two grade 3 classes, totalling twenty-six children at Mushuau Innu Natuashish School in Newfoundland and Labrador. The chapter bought teacher supplies and educational materials that could be used for more than one year and that could be shared by the two teachers, such as high interest, low vocabulary books and a two-year subscription to *National Geographic for Kids*. In addition, the chapter sent thirty pairs of waterproof mitts, socks, hand knitted colorful hats and balaclavas. The chapter shipped seven boxes and took advantage of Canada Post's free shipping in October.

**IODE Bertha Cane Chapter**, Newmarket, supported a Kindergarten class of eight students at Labrador Straits Academy, Labrador.

**IODE Dr. Elizabeth Bagshaw**, Hamilton, sent a shipment of school supplies to Deer Lake but lack of communication with this school forced the chapter to adopt a new grade 3 class of twenty students at Kattawapiskak Elementary School in Attawapiskat, Ontario. Two parcels were shipped containing school supplies, Christmas snacks, treats and activities for the children as well as a gift for the new teacher. This teacher sent pictures back to the chapter displaying the hats and holding the gifts.

**IODE Dr. Innis Mary MacDonald Chapter**, Markham, supported a grade 3 class of twentythree students at Peacock Elementary School, Happy Valley-Goose Bay, Labrador. This year, the chapter shopped in August and took advantage of the back-to-school sales. The teacher confirmed receipt of twenty-three pencil boxes filled with coloured pencils, erasers, glue sticks, crayons, pencil with sharpener, markers, and tissues. Other school supplies along with seven scarves were also sent. Two Christmas boxes full of cookies, hot chocolate, crafts, and decorations rounded out the shipment for 2023. Canada Post's prepaid boxes reduced the cost of shipping for the chapter.

**IODE Errol Egremont Chapter**, Sarnia, continued to support twenty-two students in a grade 2 class at Amos Comenius Memorial School in Hopedale, Labrador. Five parcels were shipped in 2023, taking advantage of Canada Post's free shipping every Tuesday in October for two of the shipments. The Fall parcel included a 10 lb. bag of apples, cookies, Halloween candy, Rice Krispie squares and assorted treats. Christmas stockings, chocolates, crayons, colouring books, note pads, pencil crayons, markers, glue, rulers, stickers, construction paper, exercise books, paints, paint brushes, craft items, seasonal socks, toques, and mitts were also included in the packing. The teachers also received an IODE calendar, teacher notebook, sticky notes, and a scarf and toque set, a copy of *Echoes*, IODE bookmarks and IODE brochures.

**IODE Festival Jubilee Chapter**, Stratford, supported the grade 1 class of sixteen students at Lake Melville School, Northwest River, Labrador. The chapter sent four parcels to the school, one at Easter, Christmas, and again at the beginning and end of the school year to the children. These parcels included items such as colouring books, crayons, toques, gloves and socks, silly putty and other toys, buckets and shovels and candy.

**IODE Freelton Chapter**, Freelton, struggled to communicate with the John C. Yesno Education Centre in Eabamet Lake. The chapter had hoped to send one parcel to the school with balls, skipping ropes, and clothing and delivered by the Ontario Provincial Police but was unsuccessful. The chapter will decide what to do in 2024.

**IODE Kathleen Drope Chapter**, Toronto, supported a grade 1 class at Peacock Elementary School in Happy Valley-Goose Bay. In May, a box containing outdoor play items such as a Frisbee, sidewalk chalk, foam balls, markers and games was sent. The November packing included donated socks, mitts and some books. French books, bought by a member, were sent and shared with another school in that area.

**IODE Laurentian Chapter**, Ottawa, supported two classes at Lawrence Wesley School at Cat Lake, Northern Ontario, a grade 2/3 class, and a grade 5/6 class, totalling fifty-two students. A parcel was sent by the chapter in March and included packets of seeds and starter kits, outdoor equipment, toothbrushes, and toothpaste. In addition, three Christmas parcels were shipped. Photos have been requested by the chapter. For the second year in a row, a daughter of one of their members donated funds to help with shipping costs and another member continued to pay the National Geographic subscription for the grade 5/6 class.

**IODE Margaret Stokes Chapter**, Petrolia, supported a K-12 school of eight students at St. Peter's School, Black Tickle, Labrador. The chapter sent nine parcels throughout the year. Five of those parcels were sent in October, taking advantage of Canada Post's free shipping Tuesdays. Parcels included school supplies, books, puzzles, games, snacks, classroom holiday decorations, toothbrushes, and toothpaste. Hoodies, hats, gloves, and socks were also sent. Two large Christmas parcels included small gifts, treats, and flannel pajama pants for each child. There were two preschool-aged children on the island who received items in the Christmas parcel as well.

**IODE Stirling Chapter**, St. Thomas, supported a kindergarten class of eleven students at Labrador Straits Academy, Labrador. Three packages were sent in March, September, and November. The parcels held many craft and art items for the students as well as items for the classroom that related to the appropriate season, treats, story books, pencils, erasers, markers, and a large floor puzzle of the map of Canada. Mittens and socks were included in the packing. There was good interaction between the kindergarten class and the chapter.

**IODE The Princes Richard and Michael Chapter**, Kitchener, supported a grade 1 class of thirty-four students at Sheshatshiu Innu School in Newfoundland and Labrador. The parcels that were sent were acknowledged in writing and were needed. The chapter sent sixteen boxes of supplies over the past year to their class. These boxes included basic school supplies such as glue sticks, stickers, pencils, crayons, pens, paper, binders, paint, erasers, colouring books, magnets, toys, and white board markers, as well as craft materials, and games. Granola bars, candy, Ziploc bags, seeds, toothbrushes, Band-aids, and decorations were also sent for special occasions. In addition, toques, mittens, and socks that were requested were also sent.

**IODE Trillium 2023 Chapter,** virtual, adopted a grade 1 class of seventeen students at Kattawapiskak Elementary School in Attawapiskat, Ontario. Three parcels were shipped with items that were requested by the teacher. These items included motivational pencils, coloured pencils with sharpeners, cloth pencil cases, toothbrushes and toothpaste and water bottles for each student, and stickers. The chapter also wrote pen pal letters at Christmas to each of the seventeen students and the teachers shared some pictures of the students with the items.

**IODE Val Griffiths Chapter**, Dorchester, supported two schools in Northern Ontario. The first was Martin McKay Memorial School in Sachigo Lake and the other was Moosonee Public School in Moosonee. There were twenty-four classrooms and 363 students serviced by the chapter. Gift cards from Indigo Books, through IODE Canada's FlipGive program, were used to buy library books, particularly for younger students at Moosonee while Martin MacKay used the gift cards to buy computer programs for online books and educational resources.

**IODE West Gwillimbury Chapter**, Bradford, supported seventeen students in a grade 7 class at Jens Haven Memorial School in Nain, Labrador.

**IODE White Cloud Chapter**, Wiarton, supported Samson Beardy Memorial School in Muskrat Dam, Ontario, a K-8 school with fifty students by providing them with two yearly subscriptions, one for the *National Geographic Kids* edition and the other was the *National Geographic* for the library.

**IODE Bemersyde Chapter**, Campbellford, member Lisa Cossar, continued to support a grade 1 class of twenty-two students at Peacock Primary School, Happy Valley-Goose Bay, Labrador. Canada Post's free shipping allowed Lisa to ship four parcels to the school for \$14.39 instead of \$127. These four parcels held school supplies, granola bars, hat/mitt/slipper sets for each student and teacher, as well as blank Christmas cards, stickers and IODE Jean Throop Award books. A letter was included with each parcel along with personal photos of life in Ontario.

**IODE Errol Egremont Chapter,** Sarnia, members Michelle Batty and her three granddaughters, (Amber, Bryauna, Eralyn Batty), supported a grade 2 class at Kattawapiskak Elementary School in Attawapiskat, Ontario. Three parcels were sent for Easter, Halloween, and Christmas which included 10 lbs. of apples, cookies, candy, craft items, twine, beads, feathers, glue, wire, exercise books, construction paper, pencil crayons, markers, crayons, rulers, stickers, socks, and toques. The teacher received a teacher's notebook, gloves, sticky notes, a copy of *Echoes*, IODE bookmarks and IODE brochures.

In total, \$16,657 was spent by chapters and two individuals (and their families) to support our Adopted Schools in Northern Ontario and in Newfoundland and Labrador. The cost of shipping these supplies was \$3,548, and even though the cost of shipping continued to rise and communication with schools and staff remained an issue for several chapters, the IODE women in Ontario were determined to help children. Members continued to ask for help in their communities, accepted donations and took advantage of Canada Post's free shipping every Tuesday in October to provide support for students. One IODE member reached out to her local school to partner with a class or two and asked the parent council if they would pay the shipping costs.

Primary chapter Adopted School officers met via three Zoom meetings in 2023. Education officers were able to share their stories, discuss difficulties, obtain information about shipping/cost savings and network. It is always so nice to hear what chapters have been doing for their adopted schools.

Hopefully, in 2024, IODE can continue to support the schools and that more chapters and/or individuals might like to adopt a class. Congratulations to all chapters and individuals who contributed to these Adopted Schools programs.

The value of Services work in 2023 increased by \$73,000 over 2022. One main focus of chapters was food insecurity. Financial and tangible donations to food banks, school breakfast programs, homeless shelters, etc. doubled from that of 2022.

IODE Ontario primary chapters were generous once again to the provincial packing room with donations of knitting, clothing and footwear. Seventeen primary chapters donated items valued at \$41,833 and were packed into 103 boxes for sending to remote Northern Ontario Indigenous nursing clinics and schools. On behalf of IODE Canada, 30 boxes were packed for Nunavut and Labrador communities. The OPP Indigenous Team and NAPS (Nishnabee Aski Police Services) Officers took 33 boxes on behalf of IODE and also distributed 20 bags of winter clothing, boots, medical supplies and bedding in communities where there was a need.

Clothing and medical supplies were donated to Ukrainian refugees and some supplies given to a Ukrainian Church that was collecting supplies and clothing to fly to Ukraine. It was a heart-warming experience to meet a family that assisted refugees getting settled in Canada. Donations of knitting, toys, yarn and clothing were also received from the public who found out about IODE Services work on the IODE Ontario website and asked about needed donations.

In September, more than 350 art kits for children and youth were put together by provincial officers and convenors to go into the Christmas parcels. Also, 57 Christmas gift bags were crocheted/sewn by chapter members and friends of IODE. These bags were filled with hair brushes, lotions, jewellery, etc. for the Christmas parcels.

At the 2023 Provincial Annual Meeting, the 2023/2024 Services project was announced; 'New Beginnings, A Mom and Baby Shower'. Since that announcement, chapters have delivered filled gift bags for babies, baby blankets/quilts, baby clothing and grooming products to the provincial office. The new moms are also receiving gift bags, lotions, soaps and hair accessories. The project will wind up at the 2024 Provincial Annual Meeting.

Communicating with primary chapter services officers remained a high priority. A Services Newsletter was sent in May which included the 2022 Services Annual Report, announcement of the 2023 Provincial Services project and other pertinent information. In the Fall of 2023, a new initiative was undertaken which was the emailing of items of interest to primary chapter services officers. This email contained excerpts from the Services reports presented to the Provincial Executive Committee each month.

After reading the primary chapter Services annual reports, it was clear that chapters had resumed their busy service activities with the relaxation of COVID restrictions. Listed below are some of the many projects chapter members participated in.

**IODE 48<sup>th</sup> Highlanders Chapter**, Toronto, donated pajamas to a women's shelter in North York.

**IODE Angela Bruce Chapter**, Oakville, focused on helping to alleviate food insecurity by donating to multiple food banks and shelters.

**IODE Bemersyde Chapter**, Campbellford, donated funds to several community organizations; food bank, hospice, shelter, church and Community Care for their programs.

IODE Bertha Cane Chapter, Newmarket, focused on alleviating food insecurity.

**IODE Bridlewood Chapter**, Toronto, provided funds to the Agincourt Community Centre Services Association to support the lunch program, food bank and replenish the IODE clothing cupboard (socks, underwear, toiletries).

**IODE Captain Garnet Brackin Chapter**, Chatham, recognized the increased need for food assistance in the community, took the organizer of a pantry feeding program shopping, and filled half a pickup truck bed with food.

**IODE Captain Hooper Chapter**, Carleton Place, purchased new helmets for a therapeutic riding program.

**IODE Catherine McVean Chapter**, Dresden, worked on many special projects including a trail restoration, provision of lights and materials for a 'Tree of Tribute', assistance to the local archives and a local Legion program.
