A message from President Linda ...

In 2020, the National Chapter of IODE turned 120 years old and the Provincial Chapter of Ontario turned 100 years. These are significant milestones in the history of IODE.

In ancient times, Romans placed stone pillars called 'obelisks' along the roadways. Typically, the stones were put a mile apart and each were given a unique number, serving as markers or reference points reassuring travellers that the proper path was being followed. In the centre of Rome, the 'Golden Milestone' (Milliarium Aureum) was erected to mark the presumed centre of the empire. This milestone has since been lost.

We are all familiar with the word "milestone" but we use it in a slightly different way. In modern dictionary, "milestone" is defined as an action or event marking a significant change or stage in development.

As it sometimes happens, longevity could create complacency, deviation from intended goals or cause the "milestones" to become obliterated, illegible or ineffective. In 1900, Margaret Polson Murray established IODE amidst war and strife and mandated women to go into action to help fellowmen and country. Through the years, this mandate became more specific and expansive to include the numerous facets of education, community service and citizenship programs.

That mandate remains relevant today, but like the Roman milestones, it has, at times, become somewhat illegible, obliterated or unconsciously osmosized, resulting in slight deviations. When Mrs. Murray started IODE, there was no mention of fundraising.

Somewhere along the line, the emergence of bursaries and scholarships, citizenship programs and tangible help to community agencies necessitated the process of fundraising in order to accomplish philanthropic projects. It is understandable that one cannot give what one does not have.

In itself, fundraising is not bad, but when there is a shift in priorities from the primary goal to the mechanics of fundraising and overshadows the reason for fundraising, then we have missed the marker. And in some extreme cases, when it becomes the main focal point of the existence as a chapter and the chapter decides not to continue because they have run out of fundraising ideas or have been unable to engage members to work on fundraisers or lose motivation and incentive altogether, then we have taken the wrong path in IODE.

COVID had markedly disrupted our lives and particularly, in IODE, it had been very different and challenging to say the least. Many chapters have not been able to meet in person, have not been able to start or continue with chapter projects and many of us could not fundraise.

You have heard the saying: "When life throws you a rainy day, play in the puddles." I am happy to report that IODE members "played in the puddles".



They started to think out of the box and came up with new and ingenious ways or modify old ways of helping their communities. Instead of home tours, they created drive-by events, one was called "A-Door-Ables" where home owners decorated their doors and the public drove by to view, judge and enjoy. Door owners were rewarded for their efforts with prizes. Some resorted to curb-side sales of baked items and preserves. A few members did not only open their hearts but they also opened their car trunks with all genre of books for free distribution. Many utilized social media and internet to sell gift certificates, chocolates, books, and IODE wearables on-line.

I am especially impressed to hear that many chapters, despite not being able to "fundraise", continued to "fun-raise". Chapter members exhibited their talents and capabilities by making masks and donating them to frontline workers, seniors and children in their communities. Socially distanced and with face coverings, members distributed crocheted flowers and hearts, home-crafted cards (holiday themed) with messages of love and encouragement for the shut-ins, alone and lonely. Members went grocery shopping for seniors and the indisposed, supported local businesses with take-outs and gift cards and helped other community agencies impacted by COVID. Chapters did drive-bys to distribute toys, books and coloring books to pre-schoolers.

There are also other fundraising options whereby shopping needs were safely met by participating in programs that are mutually beneficial for the giver and receiver; one that comes to mind is the National Chapter's partnership with Indigo/Chapters whereby purchases benefit the IODE Snack Pack Program.

In my "visits" to primary chapter meetings, I learned so much about their projects and ideas. At Ottawa's IODE Laurentian Chapter's General Annual Meeting, I was wowed by the excellent and comprehensive way that their secretary documented and shared the chapter's annual report, using PowerPoint. I learned how IODE Lord Dufferin Chapter in Orangeville had one of their best Geranium sales ever. I enjoyed hearing about the fun and the energy of a group of "seasoned' young-at-heart members of the IODE White Cloud Chapter in Wiarton, as they managed to pack and distribute their seniors' Christmas bags and school supplies donations for their local elementary school during COVID lockdown. A new member of the IODE Captain Hooper Chapter in Carleton Place, drew up a proposal for a program called "Acorn to Oak" or "Kindness Wins" which is not only pandemic-appropriate, but adoptable as a post-pandemic, permanent program for every primary chapter to embrace.

In that proposal it stated: "Empowering Children to be kind to others in difficult times and reach out to our Seniors in Nursing Homes with pictures/ notes/ crafts."

In the presentation, there were listings of suggested actions like:

- Ideas to encourage children/ schools
- Have individual members/ community members via Facebook sponsor a school for the month. i.e., \$20 with tax receipt can either go straight to the participating school for their kindness draws, which they all have or give out draws of 4-\$5 gift cards.
- We could also ask businesses to sponsor a month or year, ones who are doing well in the pandemic, so basically grocery stores and gift cards from them for draws. They could also get a tax receipt. What other business are thriving from the shutdowns?
- This official program would make us eligible to apply for various grants to support draws through various programs across Canada and also the City of Ottawa/ province.

Thank you IODE Ontario members! We, at the Provincial Chapter are proud of you. I suspect that when we read and compile the Special Secretary's COVID Reports for the 2020 Annual Report, that we will be able to share with everyone all the good works done by IODE members that required little or no fundraising.



For those who think they have run out of ideas, here are a few that can be implemented once chapters return to inperson meetings:

- Setting up a committee of IODE members to make new immigrants welcome, teach them English and help them immerse in the Canadian culture and way of life.
- Organizing a regular reading session or a craft workshop for children, youth and physically and mentally challenged individuals.
- Have a monthly roster of members who will visit and spend a half an hour or so with the seniors, the lonely, sick and alone.
- Continue to volunteer at citizenship courts, blood clinics and food banks.

As always, the promotion of all charitable work performed by IODE members is very important. When I was in publishing in charge of advertising, I always put this little reminder that said:

"Doing business without advertising is like winking in the dark; you know what you are doing, but nobody else does."

Therefore, I encourage all primary chapters to issue press releases and post social media entries, accentuating the good deeds done by your members. Talk IODE, brag about the good you do. Share the fun you have at meetings (zoom or otherwise) and when working together on a project while apart. This may just be THE way to entice other women to join hands with us in IODE.

What we have accomplished, what we have learned and what we have become during the COVID pandemic regime are milestones! Let us ensure that they remain as im-

portant markers to keep us on the right path and to stay committed to "enhancing the quality of life for those in need through education support, community service and citizenship programs." I will leave you with this visual thought:

Let us engage as many hands as we can and together, we will see the endless possibilities that we have as members of a benevolent

organization - IODE. See you on Zoom at the 101st Virtual Provincial Annual Meeting on April 24, 2021! Let us always stay connected!

IODE Lois Laughren Award for Women in STEM at Ryerson University

t the 2019 Provincial Annual Meeting in Kingston, we recognized Past Provincial President, Lois Laughren. Lois G. Laughren was President of IODE Ontario from 2001 to 2003. She had been a member of IODE since 1959 until her death in November 2010. In 1985, she moved to Burlington and transferred her membership to the IODE Wellington Square Chapter. As Lois and Ken Laughren had no children of their own, IODE was the beneficiary of Lois' generosity.

Her donation has allowed IODE Ontario to establish the **IODE Ontario Lois Laughren Award for Women in STEM at Ryerson University**. This award will be given to women who have completed at least one year of university and are pursuing an education in the fields of Science, Technology, Engineering or Mathematics.

The IODE Ontario Lois Laughren Award for Women in STEM has donated \$25,000 that was matched through Ryerson University's PACE (President's Awards to Champion Excellence) fund, giving a total of \$50,000. The Award is offered to five women at \$2,000 each (\$10,000 annually) for a period of 5 years.

The Ryerson University chose the following recipients for the second STEM awards in 2020. IODE Ontario extends *Congratulations* to the following students:

WE are almost there...

In 1923, IODE Ontario identified a need to adopt and support schools in Northern Ontario by advocating and promoting literacy. Today, we are taking a more holistic approach to education, and embracing the intellectual, emotional, and social aspects of a child's life.

We wish to give a huge shout out to all primary chapters who have adopted a class or school in Ontario and Labrador. You have made such a difference in the lives of school age children. Chapters have donated yearly subscriptions to children's magazines, laptops, mitts, hats, scarves, coats, games, stickers, workbooks, crafts, chocolates, apples, etc. to their adopted schools. *Thank you!*

In commemoration of IODE Ontario's 100th Anniversary last year and considering the important value of play in a child's development, Phase II of "*Project Fun*" called, "*Play It Forward*", identified the need for play and sporting equipment for the children of the remote Northern Ontario schools. The adopted schools were contacted to obtain their wish lists for their play and sporting needs.

The schools and their children have very little. Many students suffer from food insecurities, depression, poor living conditions, isolation, abuse and with COVID-19 in their communities, much of their schooling is being done remotely. Many of these students do not have internet access or computers, making life that much more difficult. When students return to school, it is our hope that IODE can supply them with sporting equipment to enhance their physical, emotional and social experience.

In addition to these challenges, many schools only have access to purchase merchandise by plane in the summer months or ice roads in the winter, making delivery to these remote schools almost impossible and costly.

IODE Ontario has adopted schools in ten remote areas of Northern Ontario, but have only received requests from schools in Moosonee, Deer Lake, Cat Lake, Sachigo Lake, Kashechewan and Sandy Lake for play and sporting equipment.

IODE Ontario has raised \$10,436.00 of the target goal of \$15,000. The requests for play and sports equipment alone from the Northern schools total over \$10,000, without shipping costs. Shipping costs will be exorbitant.

IODE Ontario is exploring different avenues to procure funds needed for the shipping costs. Your personal or chapter donations will be very helpful and will go a long way to meeting these costs. We are therefore asking for your assistance and we have included a donation line on the 2021 Provincial Annual Meeting registration form. As usual, personal donations of over \$20 will receive a tax receipt.



Citizenship News from IODE Dr. Herbert A. Bruce Chapter, North Bay

"Window on Canada: Citizenship Celebrations in Shop Windows"

The IODE Herbert A. Bruce Chapter in North Bay uses the window in their second-hand store, the **Victory Shop** for some of Canada's yearly celebrations. Chapters without a shop might use the same ideas by asking local merchants for the use of a window for these special celebrations.



Canada Day, Remembrance Day, and recently Orange Shirt Day have all been celebrated in the Victory Shop window. The Remembrance Day committee has worked with community groups and citizens to put the emphasis on today's military rather than the past. Themes included the Invictus Games, work of the Military Family Resource Centre at the Armed Forces Base, the Royal Canadian Legion, collections of military memorabilia and the 80th anniversary of the Battle of Britain (see photo).

The window that involved the most members (and attracted much attention) was entitled,

"Canada's Family". Members were asked to loan photos of former and current family members who served in the Armed Forces. These photos were copied and "framed" with mats. They were identified primarily with a family title like "COUSIN CYRIL" along with other information like "Royal Canadian Navy, Destroyers, North Atlantic, World War II". When the framed photos were displayed at the window (with the usual Remembrance Day wreath and poppies) they filled the window and made the point that all those veterans were part of a Canadian family.

Canada Day windows use the usual Canadian flags, but also included souvenirs and art or photographs of Canada's majestic scenery to remind viewers of how lucky we are to live in Canada. Members were happy to provide memories of their travels or art from their collections.

Orange Shirt Day uses the children's book of the same title, and orange shirts of course, to remind all Canadians of the tragedy of Residential Schools and the destruction of First Nations' cultures.

Our members had to be talked into this topic, which is relatively new, but reaction of customers in the shop and passing school children convinced us that this was a part of Canadian history that needed to be remembered.

This use of a shop window has many positive results. It is excellent public relations, it costs little and involves all of the members. It also fulfills the IODE mandate of good citizenship and support for the military during this time of COVID isolation.




100 Hoodies/Track pants Project to Continue ...






