In conjunction with the 100 years Anniversary of IODE Ontario, 1<sup>st</sup> Vice-President, Education Officer and Archivist Helen Danby, Past President Bonnie Rees and their team compiled an amazing book that I feel every member and every library in Ontario should have. This book includes a chronological IODE Ontario history, information about past IODE departments, IODE hospitals and cenotaphs erected by primary chapters, past IODE Ontario executives and an extensive listing of Ontario IODE primary chapters and their mottos. - Platinum Jubilee: As you know, IODE's patron, Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II is celebrating 70 years of her Queenship. Please share with us at IODE Ontario how your chapter celebrated or will be celebrating the Queen's Platinum Jubilee.
- Making IODE Ontario your charity of choice: Practically everyone has been impacted in one way or another by the COVID-19 pandemic. Although there have been numerous positive consequences of this unprecedented event that emerged in 2020, there have been negative ones too. Your jurisdictional chapter, IODE Ontario has not been exempt from these. IODE depends on membership fees for sustainability in order to carry out the mandates of education support, community services and implement citizenship programs. We do not receive government assistance and we depend on donations to supplement the decreased revenues from the membership. Everything possible to cut operating costs and to encourage increase in members is being done. These efforts are ongoing. But unfortunately, so are the expenses of maintaining an office in Hamilton and one part-time office administrative assistant.

Why do we need an office? One project we undertake on a consistent basis at the Provincial Office is the support of the remote, isolated Northern Ontario First Nations communities under the Services Department. We send boxes of needed items to the 14 Northern communities and two Southwestern Ontario First Nations communities. In addition to this, we send to five Nunavut and nine Labrador communities. In order to accomplish this, we need room to store donated and purchased items, a packing venue, staff assistance during shipping and everything else relevant to this very essential project.

Many avenues for amelioration are being explored and one recently created is the "IODE Ontario Donors Circle". This is a sustainability initiative open to individuals and groups (in and out of IODE) for the purpose of providing a financial base that will allow for the viable operation of IODE Ontario in order to carry out the core activities and charitable programs and projects managed and supported by the Provincial Chapter. On the next page is a Donors Circle flyer which I would encourage you to share with everyone. As is consistent with IODE's giving program, donations of \$20 or more will receive a charitable tax receipt.

## Here's Why IODE Members Are So Productive and Resilient

"The director of the George Washington University School of Medicine argues that the brain of an older person is much more practical than is commonly believed. At this age, the interaction of the right and left hemispheres of the brain becomes harmonious, which expands our creative possibilities. That is why among people over 60 years of age you can find many personalities who have just started their creative activities.

Of course, the brain is no longer as fast as it was in youth. However, it gains in flexibility. Therefore, with age, we are more likely to make the right decisions and are less exposed to negative emotions. The peak of human intellectual activity occurs around the age of 70, when the brain begins to function at full strength.

Over time, the amount of myelin in the brain increases, a substance that facilitates the rapid passage of signals between neurons. Due to this, intellectual abilities increase by 300% compared to the average.

Also interesting is the fact that after 60 years, a person can use 2 hemispheres at the same time. This allows you to solve much more complex problems.

Professor Monchi Uri, from the University of Montreal, believes that the old man's brain chooses the path that consumes less energy, eliminates the unnecessary and leaves only the right options to solve the problem. A study was conducted involving different age groups. Young people were very confused when passing the tests, while those over 60 years of age made the right decisions.

Now, let's look at the characteristics of the brain between the ages of 60 and 80. They are really pink.

#### Characteristics of the Brain of an Elderly Person

- 1. Neurons in the brain do not die, as everyone around you says. The connections between them simply disappear if one does not engage in mental work.
- 2. Distraction and forgetfulness arise due to an overabundance of information. Therefore, it is not necessary for you to concentrate your whole life on unnecessary trifles.
- 3. From the age of 60, a person, when making decisions, does not use one hemisphere at the same time, like young people, but both.
- 4. Conclusion: if a person leads a healthy lifestyle, moves, has viable physical activity and is fully mentally active, intellectual abilities do NOT decrease with age, they simply GROW, reaching a peak at the age of 80-90 years.

So do not be afraid of old age.

- Strive to develop intellectually.
- Learn new crafts, make music, learn to play musical instruments, paint pictures!



- Dance!
- Take an interest in life, meet and communicate with friends
- Plan for the future, travel as best you can.
- Do not forget to go to shops, cafes, shows.
- Don't shut up alone, it's destructive to anyone.
- Live with the thought: "All good things are still ahead of me!"

## Meet IODE Ontario's 2021 OCADU Recipient

A student from the Ontario College of Art and Design University (OCADU) has been a recipient of Provincial IODE education support since 1981. Records show that funding was provided periodically between 1954 and 1970 to worthy art students. We have been fortunate to have OCADU's cooperation in selecting deserving candidates for this award.

Our recipient this past year was Chris Canales-Cisneros. When congratulations were sent to Chris, he included this message in his reply: "I am a second-vear drawing and painting student. My work often focuses



on various political and social issues concerning my identity as a queer Latin-American artist. However, I have had to refrain from depicting some of these subjects due to my living situation during the pandemic and the conservative nature of the residence.

First and foremost, I would like to thank you for granting me the opportunity to be a recipient of this generous scholarship. This past year has been one with many difficulties, including unprecedented financial constraints, which I am sure is a dilemma that many members of society are faced with. Members of the artistic community such as myself have had to adapt within our personal lives and in our artistic process.

Personally, I have had to purchase an array of supplies that would ensure my safety and success in my makeshift studio. The bursary's added support allowed me to acquire new oil-paint mediums, clamp lights, and wood to create a provisional easel.

Once again, I would like to extend my gratitude for the generous donation and look forward to the artwork it will help me create this term."

#### **IODE Gladys Raiter Award**

To honour the memory of Gladys Raiter, her husband donated a monetary gift in 1977 to the IODE Queen Anne Chapter in Kitchener. However, in 1978 the chapter retired and the funds were given to the IODE Municipal Chapter of Kitchener to continue the IODE bursary. When the Municipal Chapter disbanded in 1990, the money was forwarded to the jurisdictional chapter of IODE Ontario to administer. The capital received was invested and the yearly accrued interest is used to provide the funds for the bursary. Recipients of the IODE Gladys Raiter Bursary must be from the Kitchener-Waterloo area and must be enrolled in a post-graduate program of a university there. The 2021 recipient of the IODE Gladys Raiter Bursary is Phil LeMaitre and he has provided the following bio:

"Phil LeMaitre is a Master of Science student at the University of Waterloo, with an academic focus in Theoretical Physics. He previously attended the University of Guelph, obtaining his Bachelor of Science with Honours, and was on the Dean's list for most of his undergraduate studies. During his time at the University of Guelph, he developed a rigorous work ethic that continues to aid in his contribution to the knowledge of physics. Phil's current research primarily focuses on applying techniques from polymer physics to simulate atomic and molecular systems on the computer, where he has excelled and stood out to his mentors and professors as an "outstanding student in an outstanding program."



Outside of Physics, Phil is an avid reader exploring philosophy, classic literature, and the sciences. He thoroughly enjoys debating and discussing interesting topics and practices. He has a special interest in computers, even building his own. Phil plans to continue his international travel explorations to places with historic or scientific significance and attain a healthy dose of the local culture. He maintains an active lifestyle, enjoying weightlifting and cycling.

Phil aims to continue his education through doctoral studies upon completion of his master's program, but ultimately his goal is to pursue professorship and

reaffirm his ambition to help lead the next generation of scientists into the field of Theoretical Physics.

## IODE Ontario Lois Laughren Award for Women in STEM at Ryerson





Would you like to ask your city/town council to proclaim a day as IODE Day? You can do that! Contact your city offices by phone or at their website. Be ready to give them information on IODE and what your chapter is doing or has done in the community. Don't forget to include lots of information, pictures, and your fundraising events.

There are many times when your town council is looking to speak with members of the community, so take this opportunity to do so. It's almost like when our founding member, Margaret Polson did a letter campaign to all the mayors across this great nation back in 1900.

Don't be shy about placing your posters and brochures in doctors' offices or hospital waiting rooms. (Get permission first). Often, wait times can be long in those places and having something to read would fill the time. If they don't read it, just their availability may be enough to get them to further investigate IODE.

Get those cameras ready, take pictures of your events and write an article to submit to the newspapers. Chances are greater that your submission will be included if the work is done for them.

Recognizing our members is important to IODE. Your chapter can award a primary life membership to a deserving member. Years of service recognition pins are available to award to your members. There are 5, 10, 20, (a limited number of 25-yr. service pins are still available as this is being eventually phased out), 30, 40, 50 or 60-year membership service pins are available from the National office. Use these to say thank you for all that you have done for your chapter and community. Below are photos of the pins. (No photos of the 20-year and 60-year pins are available at this time, but they will be similar to the 5, 10, 30-year pins.)



Does your chapter have "Who we Are" presentation board? It can be a poster or sandwich board or trifold (available at your dollar store). Place info on it about what your chapter, what you have done in the community, including pictures to draw the eye and contact information for your chapter.

Do you have a social media presence, if so, use it to your chapter's and IODE's advantage.

During these tough times, make sure to keep in touch with members of your chapter; pick up the phone and call, send a post card/letter the old-fashioned way or send an email or text. Just to let them know that they are in your thoughts.

Primary chapters continue with their activities and haven't let COVID slowed them down. Hats off to those IODE primary chapters! All questions are welcome, also your ideas of how IODE Ontario can help you grow your membership. Stay well. Stay connected.



## The Wisdom of Dr. Bonnie Henry

Dr. Henry is the Provincial Health Officer for British Columbia, the first woman in this position. She is also an associate professor at the University of British Columbia. She has a background in epidemiology and is a specialist in public health and preventive medicine. She is also from PEI.

- 1. We may have to live with COVID-19 for months or years. Let's not deny it or panic. Let's not make our lives useless. Let's learn to live with this fact.
- 2. You can't destroy COVID-19 viruses that have penetrated cell walls, by drinking gallons of hot water, you'll just go to the bathroom more often.
- 3. Washing hands and maintaining a two-meter physical distance is the best method for your protection.
- 4. If you don't have a COVID-19 patient at home, there's no need to disinfect the surfaces at your house.
- 5. Packaged cargo, gas pumps, shopping carts and ATMs do not cause infection. If you wash your hands, live your life as usual.
- 6. COVID-19 is not a food infection. It is associated with drops of infection like the 'flu. There is no demonstrated risk that COVID-19 is transmitted by food.
- 7. You can lose your sense of smell with a lot of allergies and viral infections. This is only a non-specific symptom of COVID-19.
- 8. Once at home, you don't need to change your clothes urgently and go shower! Purity is a virtue, paranoia is not!
- 9. The COVID-19 virus doesn't hang in the air for long. This is a respiratory droplet infection that requires close contact.
- 10. The air is clean, you can walk through the gardens and through parks (just keeping your physical protection distance).
- 11. It is sufficient to use normal soap against COVID-19, not antibacterial soap. This is a virus, not a bacteria.
- 12. You don't have to worry about your food orders. But you can heat it all up in the microwave, if you wish.
- 13. The chances of bringing COVID-19 home with your shoes is like being struck by lightning twice in a day. I've been working against viruses for 20 years drop infections don't spread like that!
- 14. You can't be protected from the virus by taking vinegar, sugarcane juice and ginger! These are for immunity not a cure.
- 15. Wearing a mask for long periods interferes with your breathing and oxygen levels. Wear it only in crowds.
- 16. Wearing gloves is also a bad idea; the virus can accumulate into the glove and be easily transmitted if you touch your face. Better just to wash your hands regularly.

Immunity is greatly weakened by always staying in a sterile environment. Even if you eat immune boosting foods, please go out of your house regularly to any park/beach. Immunity is increased by EXPOSURE TO PATHOGENS, not by sitting at home and consuming fried/ spicy/sugary food and aerated drinks. Be smart and stay informed! Live life sensibly and to the fullest. Be Kind, Be Calm and Be Safe!
